PRESIDENT'S CORNER

The Chicago convention was non-stop amazement. Young Will Sapet pumping and singing the rolls with gusto! A Mart full of treasures, books, rolls, discs, and instruments. Marty Persky's offerings were stunning. For the pumper contest a nice Seybold piano made in Elgin, Illinois, home of the fantastic and fanciful Kresmary collection, it's Kurt's piano! I've visited fine homes and HOMES, but Kurt's abode and shop take your imagination to new places. His coffee table is a square piano illuminated with dramatic colors. The Bulletin will have a nice selection of convention photos, but all my photos can be viewed and downloaded for three months on my Google Drive:

I've been told about the Sanfilippo collection for many years, and knew I would get there someday. Well, so much fun to share the adventure with friends! The staff is really friendly and we were hosted by Jeffrey Sanfilippo and Rusty Hernandez. The Wurlitzer pipe chambers are fantastic, hence a lot of photos for my organ friends. You will see Jeffrey pushing buttons for the Traps Bells and Whistles to our delight, and his too! Dave Wickerham played a memorable concert, he knows which buttons to push too! A retractable screen over the console shows the MIDI keys when played by the computer, and a great keyboard video when Dave played.

Comprehensive is not a long enough word to describe this treasure trove. When a weak dollar tempted foreigners to buy American phonographs, Jasper collected many machines to archive in this country. There are about 300 phonographs, and my pictures show unusual models.

A huge carousel, with horses and rides that are moved from the floor, is housed in a great hall surrounded by band organs. The front of the hall has the original Howard #3 clock mechanism from Chicago's Wrigley Building, and ample room to serve dinner to the more than 230 of us. No rubber chicken here, superb fried chicken and steak, very delicious. You can visit their website Sanfilippofoundation.org for more information.

The Volo collection has the most moderne Mortier dance organ I've ever seen, whimsical vehicles, a Grand Piano CAR, a Dr. Seuss car, big enclosed carousel, and lots to enjoy. The Halim museum features stained glass windows, glass art, and a comprehensive collection of clocks.

Marty knew just where to go! We drove through Chicago downtown, it's magnificent, and doesn't look deserted like some of our cities on the West Coast.

In May I went on an Art Deco crossing with three days in Paris, one night in London, and 7 days at sea on the Queen Mary 2. Matt Tolentino assembled an amazing orchestra. I posted about 100 videos of the orchestra songs on my channel. Go to YouTube, search there for alamedam8, open a video and subscribe to my Rob Thomas channel. Search down a little to find the songs. Highlights from the 2025 MBSI & AMICA Joint Convention

rom August 20–24, 2025, the Hyatt Regency Schaumburg pulsed with mechanical melodies and collector camaraderie as members of the Musical Box Society International (MBSI) and the Automatic Musical Instrument Collectors' Association (AMICA) convened under the fitting theme: *Sweet Home Chicago*.

This year's joint convention offered more than just a reunion—it was a celebration of artistry, engineering, and shared passion, set against the backdrop of Midwest charm.

A Venue Tuned for Comfort & Connection

Returning to the spacious Hyatt Regency, the venue used for the last large gathering in Chicago, attendees enjoyed both convenience and comfort. Registration details and Mart forms were easily accessible via MBSI's website, streamlining pre-convention planning.

Touring the Treasures: Music, Mechanisms & Midwest Magic

A standout of the convention was its carefully curated morning-to-afternoon tours, each offering a blend of historical insight and mechanical marvels.


Kresmery Collection & Sanfilippo's Perfume Passage

This dual-site tour—offered Wednesday and Thursday—paired Kurt Kresmery's Elgin home collection (featuring a Welte Style 3 Cottage Orchestrion and basement full of music machines) with the Sanfilippo Estate's Perfume Passage, a 6,000-sq. ft. vintage drugstore and soda fountain brimming with perfumery artifacts. Small-group tours provided an intimate sensory experience, blending sound and scent in unexpected harmony.





































































Woelbing Collection & Organ Piper Pizza

Another Wednesday highlight: the Woelbing Collection, home to a 4-manual, 90-rank Wurlitzer theatre organ with 6,500 pipes installed in a large empty modern warehouse. An adjacent office space housed a fleet of vintage Harley-Davidsons along with two beautifully restored player pianos. An hours drive then led to lunch held at Organ Piper Pizza in Greenfield, WI. It featured live theater organ music by Zach Frame, turning a meal into a musical performance.

Halim Museum & Volo Auto Museum

Thursday's fully booked tour included Evanston's Halim Museum, known for its musical clocks, automata, and Tiffany stained glass. A museum only open to groups, attendees overwhelmed with the most beautiful pieces of artwork, stained glass and clock mechanisms. One could easily spend a full day this first class museum. Attendees then traveled to the Volo Auto Museum, a completely different venue where classic cars and automatic instruments—originally curated by AMICA's Tim Trager and now guided by Terry Younce—offered a nostalgic ride through time.







