Surrounded by assorted parts, Nate's Style 50 American Fotoplayer awaits future restoration. (Nate's beautifully refurbished Style 15 Fotoplayer was a featured attraction at the 2023 MBSI Annual Meeting in Saint Paul, and he now presents open-to-the-public silent film shows in his Anoka workshop which he accompanies live on the Style 15.) Gary's workshop houses his Aeolian Orchestrelle player reed organ and a few projects, including a work-in-progress, a 78 rpm juke box.

Back at the house, members enjoyed hearing a Mermond Freres with bells, drum, and castanets, the Young Chang grand piano with QRS Playola system, an 18-1/2 inch Mira console box, an upright 25-1/2 inch Polyphon, a Fischer & Sons Duo Art reproducing piano, plus other instruments.

A new addition to the home houses Gary's new glass gallery on the lower level with numerous cabinets displaying his collection of Steuben and Art Nouveau glass collection.

A brief business meeting was called to order reviewing upcoming events which include two more meetings and the impending auction of the late Bill Nunn's Skyrock Farm collection. After business, members enjoyed chef Gary's Cajun Shrimp Fettuccini served with Ciabatta Bread. The delicious entrée was accompanied by salads, side dishes, and desserts brought by attendees.


Afterwards, more musical entertainment was provided by Bob and Judy's well-maintained collection.
